




Directions for using this Product

- Begin by Teaching Your Students how to gather facts. Many teachers I
 work with have Personal Preferences on how they like their students to
 take notes and gather facts. So for this step, use what works best for
 you.
- You will want to Make sure students gather facts that will be necessary
 when creating Particular genres for example: "birth announcements" students will need to find out the name of baby/adult animals, species,
 gestational Period, name of that group of animal, etc. for "Baseball
 Card" students will need to find out stats- for example, height, weight,
 special characteristics.
- With cach genre, I have found it useful to show real examples, and then brainstorm with students to note the lingo, and ways they can use their own researched facts to write their own. I have included some of these anchors.
